



SENIOR PASTOR OPPORTUNITY PROFILE

At A Glance

Delhi International Christian Fellowship is seeking its next senior pastor. Building on the strong foundation passed to us, we are looking for our next leader who has the heart of a gracious shepherd, the skills of an engaging learner/teacher, and the vision for the impact of a winsome church of internationals in the great, global crossroads of New Delhi.

We know why we exist. God has uniquely placed us in this dynamic, global city to turn strangers into friends, the curious into the confident, and train God's people to have uncommon influence wherever they go. Our special assignment is to internationals (world citizens and ex-pats) who call Delhi home. And we know that EVERY person walking through our doors has three questions (often unspoken):

- 1. Can I find God here?
- 2. Can I find friends here?
- 3. Can I make a difference here?

The congregation is an English-speaking, interdenominational community of internationals who gather from around the world and who are devoted to the timeless truths, virtues, and habits of biblical Christianity.



Prior to the pandemic, the church had approximately 175 adults and 40 children attending from more than 30 countries. It is made up of diplomats, business leaders, educators, graduate students, and professional Indian nationals.



Delhi is not necessarily an easy city, but it is endlessly fascinating for the curious. Our new pastor will need to be both prepared and called to an international congregation in such an amazing place. Because of government restrictions, the pastor will need to be content focusing on reaching the tens of thousands of expatriates from around the world currently residing in Delhi NCR. Besides endless flexibility, they will need to be mature (whatever their age), operate out of deep character, be a skilled equipper for life and ministry, and decidedly compassionate. In short, have the gifts of a shepherd mixed with a heart for those far from God.

Living in Delhi

We have an apartment ready for a pastor in the middle of Delhi, in close vicinity to the Church location and quite central to where most of our congregation resides. There is a large option of markets to go to and an endless list of restaurants, shops, parks, monuments, etc. to explore during the week. Delhi is crowded, polluted, and smelly. Summer is really hot and winter is really cold. Despite the challenges you will probably fall in love with the curiosity, friendliness and openness of



people to connect. A walk in Old Delhi will amaze you and make you feel you went 100 years back in time! Or discover the parks to relax and enjoy some quiet in the big city or cool down in a shopping mall or one of the many fancy hotel restaurants that serve amazing foods. Delhi is such a mix of poor and rich, old and modern, you will always see and experience things that amaze you.

The Back Story

DICF's roots go back to Delhi Union Church. After the government stopped giving visas to religious works in 1984, that church closed and transformed into a home-church launched by a British businessman. In 2002, the congregation of 100 decided it was time to make a greater impact on the growing international community.



Indian Society status was granted to DICF in 2003 and this provided the structure whereby the Board of the society (church) could request an employment visa for a ministry administrator. This is still the structure under which pastors are called.

DICF is currently not formally affiliated with any denomination. It is in the process of becoming a part of the <u>Mission International Church Network</u>. MICN is a fraternity of approximately 70 international churches around the world who share a similar framework for mission, theology, development, and collaboration.

Our Essential Foundations

Because terminology is always shifting, describing a church's theological underpinnings is always susceptible to misunderstanding. DICF could be described as broadly evangelical within the Christian faith. We attempt to live out what the Lausanne Covenant describes as a "friendship between evangelistic passion and theological reflection."

For us, this connotes a very high view of the authority and truth of the Christian scriptures in the Bible combined with four timeless creedal declarations: the Apostles Creed, the Nicene Creed, the Athanasian Creed and the Heidelberg Catechism.* (Note: While the Catechism specifies infant baptism, as an international church with people from many different traditions, we try to accommodate baptism modes according to the traditions of our congregants' home churches.)



Our Hopeful Horizon

Along with other international churches, people are always moving home or moving on and Delhi's complexity speeds up the turnover a bit. But that pattern was accelerated by the pandemic. People moved on. Those left were not able to meet in public and government restrictions at the time limited our ability to accept offerings. Add to this that the new pastor we hired wasn't able to get into the country and had to lead services from 6,400 miles away! The restrictions in Australia lasted so long that after a year he accepted another job offer and that is why we are searching again.

Whew! We survived, we're rebuilding, and we're excited because we've got several things working in our favor.

- Long foundation of thoughtful, gracious, and winsome leadership
- Excellent reputation and working relationships for facilities, collaborations, and outreach
- Our beloved, resolute congregation
- Effective assistants and technical staff
- Untapped opportunities for contact influence among newer expatriates and internationals who are now unfamiliar with the church.
 Most of the expats are in one of these categories: diplomats, business executives, foreign students and people who come to India for medical treatment.
- Strategic proximity to diplomatic enclave of New Delhi and centrally located for expat community.





Our hope for the future

- Our vision is to get back to our position as we were pre-pandemic. No, even better than before actually!
- We need to regain our strength in numbers, in attendance as well as finance.
- We need to rebuild relationships with various Embassies, International groups and business hubs.
- Start an outreach program to reach expats. This can be done through hospital
 visits (to reach medical tourists), small groups in Embassies, starting and growing
 of multiple men/ladies/mixed groups where members can bring outsiders, and so
 many more opportunities to explore!
- We long to be on full capacity with 150-200 people attending our service each Sunday. A vibrant children and youth program and a community that is inviting, welcoming to newcomers and where deep friendships can grow.
- To be a place where the presence and peace of God is so noticeable that our Sunday service will be one of the highlights of the week where each member will be encouraged to grow in their relationship with our Heavenly Father.
- Once this is reached, we do have hopes to spread out to other areas in Delhi NCR where expats are residing, we have dreams to have satellite services in multiple places.



Our Current Hurdles

- Funding. The first is re-building our financial backbone after the pandemic. DICF
 has traditionally set out to fund the pastor's position fully and hopes to return to
 that place within two years. So, initially, a candidate would be asked to recruit a
 team of contributing financial partners for a time until as the pastor's leadership
 gets traction and the congregation grows. DICF understands this can be a
 challenge and is willing to secure coaching for the candidate.
- Facility. Our Sunday worship services meet in an auditorium rented from a wonderful and large Catholic girls' school. All other weekly and monthly programs meet in homes, hotels, clubs, and restaurants. This requires creativity for weekly programs, special events, and seasonal services.
- Opening our doors wide. The pandemic has tamed our mission (for now). It is
 time to get the word out to the one hundred thousand expats living in Delhi about
 the warmth, vibrancy, and thoughtful spiritual home that awaits them at DICF.
 - External to the church, this will require utilizing multiple social media platforms and building welcoming bridges of relationship with embassies, NGO's, clubs, and business networks.
 - Within the church, we want to give ourselves to rebuilding vibrant kids' ministries for our children, fortifying our times of passionate worship, and creating new, smaller gatherings where men and women can forge rich spiritual friendships that sustain, heal, and refresh.

Professional and Leadership Requirements

- English is one's mother tongue
- Degrees from an accredited university and theological college or seminary
- Ordained with hopefully significant international church experience
- A reader and trainer
- Sensitive to cultural, denominational, and political differences with a flexible disposition, patience, and curiosity necessary for a global setting like Delhi
- Well-organized, self-sufficient, collaborative with excellent people skills
- Gifted in leadership, communication, and team facilitation with the Board
- Heart for God and have the ability to maintain their spiritual disciplines for their own sustenance, that of their family, and the whole church
- Regularly engages those far from God in thoughtful conversations

Pastoral Benefits

- (Normally) Full-time salaried position. As stated above, the pandemic has altered
 this for the time being. But it is our intent to return to this pattern. (Note:
 Children's schooling costs will need to be raised by the pastor from outside
 sources. More information available on request.
- Health insurance and yearly paid vacation
- Furnished three bedroom apartment
- Full-time personal assistant/driver who is highly proficient regarding living and thriving in Delhi
- Car, fuel, and maintenance
- Professional entertainment expenses

When Jesus invited his disciples to open their eyes wide so that they could see fields ready for harvest, we believe he could see all the way to India. While we aren't kidding ourselves about the complex realities of living and leading in Delhi, we are convinced that compelling opportunities are also waiting.

We know that thriving over time in a global capital like Delhi involves tending to the whole sphere of needs of the pastor and family. As we're rebuilding after the pandemic, here are some of the ways we are preparing to be alert:

Pastoral Relationships and Health

- Connections and involvement with Missional International Church Network (MICN.org)
- Friendship with pastors and other faith leaders within Delhi NCR and international leaders who travel through Delhi
- o DICF provides a network of support with previous DICF pastors
- o DICF funds conferences and study leaves

Housing, Healthcare, and Getting Around

- Lovely, large flat in attractive neighborhood that is centrally located, close to large parks, transit point, schools, shopping, most embassies, and transportation hubs.
- o Excellent clinics and hospitals are near and accessible
- o DICF has its own vehicle that can accommodate most needs

• Assistants, Drivers, Professional Guides, and Cultural Coaches

- The church employs an assistant/driver who is both trusted and invaluable.
- The church has forged essential relationships within banking, accounting, and law who can guide the pastor and family through life's adjustments and transitions
- DICF has a close relationship with a deeply experienced coach for those entering India/Delhi and for those leaving.

Pastoral Salary

- While the church cannot yet fully fund during this rebuilding time, it is the church's intention to get back to that point.
- In the meantime, not only do we feel like DICF's mission is a winsome mission that many would find attractive to support, DICF will help secure the service of a professional who can help the candidate raise their additional requirements

VISION

Rebuilding after the effects of the pandemic is a challenge that also holds new opportunities. We know the future requires steady patience even as it is fueled by vision. Here are some of the phases that we envision. Of course, some of these may overlap, be out of sequence, or not always actionable, but we feel like these forecast the general direction to which we believe God is calling DICF.

Phase 1: Restoring Our Ministry Foundation (year 1)

- Prayer at the center of our ministry
- Vital, engaging Sunday service and training of our teams
- Healthy development of our Sunday school and Youth ministries
- Spiritual health and effectiveness of our Board and areas of financial oversight
- Careful system of follow-up for visitors and inclusion into groups
- Re-anchor essential relationships banking, accounting, landlords, partners
- Tech, website, social media
- Essential growth or life groups for believers

Phase 2: Opening Our Doors Wider (years 1-3)

- Process for engaging new people and former DICF'ers as contributors for DICF
- Inroads to embassies
- Inroads to groups where expats gather (e.g. Networking in Gurgaon, Delhi Network, sports teams; hobby groups)
- Inroads to schools where internationals send their children
- Vibrant youth ministry
- Invitational events and experiences
- Creation of new teams to help carry the load and expand the reach of DICF
- Inroads to students
- Inroads to internationals in need

Phase 3: Branching Out (years 4 ->)

- Expand a vision to internationals throughout the Delhi area
- Partnering in the planting of new churches or establishing satellite congregations within 30 minutes of the concentrations of internationals
- Intentional training plan to prepare people for leadership for where God takes them next
